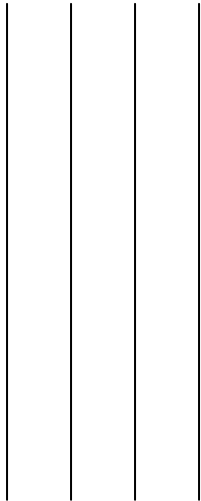

From the President:

Non-Profit Community Members:

I enjoy attending regional Rural Philanthropy Days, held across Colorado each year. These events bring Colorado's vast communities together in an effort to reacquaint private and public funders with the needs of Colorado's rural communities, all while enabling local non-profits to reacquaint themselves with the vast network their part of the state contains. Visiting with local non-profit leaders in our rural communities provides up-to-date information on rural Colorado and the many challenges and perspectives facing societies in this new century.

The Fall 2004 meeting was held in Cañon City, a clean and successful community home to our state's main prison system. Cañon City has long had the reputation of being a "prison community" and still bears that burden today. The prison system provides the majority of employment opportunities to residents of Fremont County and for better or worse, the economy looks prosperous.

Cañon City hosted an excellent two-day event that was well-attended by foundations and regional non-profit leaders alike.

Driving back to Denver from Cañon City, I reflected upon the people I had met and their various needs. I saw only one person of color at the event; a minister who moved to the City to help families whose husbands or wives are in prison. He told me about the tough situations as a result of loss of income, housing costs and lack of jobs.

All in all, I did not see very much poverty in Fremont County and I even had people tell me that the area is not impoverished. Residents seemed almost apologetic that so many funders had come to town looking for the poor, or whatever we look for with respect to our missions.


It is a good thing that Cañon City is not blighted and that the people there are proud of their city and county. We need to see more healthy communities and strong-minded leaders who will improve their communities internally rather than wait for uncertain economic aid from state and federal funds.

We all know government funding is unreliable, given it is a thermostat for the region's economy. With recent economic conditions being difficult, it was refreshing to experience such a vibrant community, faring well despite the state's recent economic hardship and resultant human services budget cuts.

Change continues to impact our beloved Colorado. As funders we find ourselves visiting healthy communities and some that are depressed with the economy relying on a spring rain for the dry land's wheat crop. We see the development of our state's recreational areas and slowly realize the burden on those venues to care for all of the residents.

I reminisce back to Cañon City where a woman told me, "We're not poor here, and I feel really blessed to be able to live in this area."

Colorado offers optimism to many. And, occasionally, geography can make up for the hardships of life.

About Our Founder:



Kenneth King was born in Nederland, Texas on August 12, 1901. His father died when Kenneth was eight years old. His early childhood days revolved around working with his widowed mother at a family-run boarding house, both in Texas and later in Denver. In 1916, he and his mother and two brothers moved to Denver. Kenneth graduated from East High School in 1918. Determined to get a good education, he enrolled at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois.

He worked his way through four years of college, driving a taxi cab in Chicago, waiting tables at his fraternity house, and selling men's clothing in the Chicago Loop.

In 1929 Kenneth King founded Columbia Savings and Loan Association in Denver, Colorado with offices in Denver, Fort Collins, Colorado Springs, Pueblo, and Littleton with field staff serving all of Colorado. In 1958, Kenneth with his brother, Harold Taft King, built the Petroleum Building at Sixteenth and Broadway.

In 1962 Columbia was sold to MCA, Inc. Kenneth remained on the Board until 1979, completing 50 years with Columbia Savings.

Kenneth King continued his work as an active philanthropist, supporting such organizations as Goodwill Industries, the Leukemia Society, Easter Seal Society, and countless church, civic and social services organizations.

While active with Columbia Savings, he hired a number of disabled employees and in 1963 was named Colorado Employer of the Year by then Governor John Love, and later received the Distinguished Service Award from President Lyndon Johnson, who cited him for "encouraging and promoting the employment of handicapped people."

He was a life member of Sigma Chi Fraternity. The Omega Chapter House at Northwestern University bears his name.

During his presidency of the Denver Lions Club, he formed the Denver Lions Foundation, recognizing the need for Foundations to raise and distribute funds to worthwhile causes, such as the Lions' blind and hearing programs.

In 1990, Kenneth King founded the Kenneth King Foundation and became the organization's first president. Upon his death on April 25, 1992, Stevens Park Kinney II became the Foundation's second president and the Board of Directors selected by Kenneth King became active.

In the latter part of 1993, President Kinney succumbed to a serious illness, and the five-member board elected Vice President Robert F. Sweeney to assume the current presidency in 1994.

The Board meets quarterly and at special meetings to review business operations and review grant proposals.

Kenneth King's motto throughout his life - and strongly carried out by his Foundation is:

"To do the common thing in an uncommon way"
