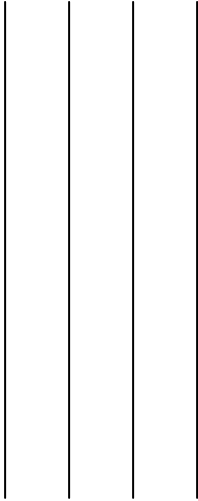

Bernice A. Bettis, Wyoming native and dedicated secretary of the Kenneth King Foundation, died peacefully on February 23, 2008 at her Sunrise Living home after having just reached her 93rd birthday on Feb. 1, 2008.

Nicknamed "BB" by her associates and close friends she worked at Columbia Savings and Loan for founding President Kenneth King for 45 years.

Bernice Bettis was executive secretary to Mr. King for 45 years and secretary of the King Foundation for 12 years before retiring at age 89. She authored a book on Mr. King's life that was published in 2005, "That Man Was Special."

Bernice A. Bettis was born in Newcastle, Wyo. Feb. 1, 1915 to Arthur and Gertrude Bettis. She was the youngest and last survivor of three older brothers, Lee, Glenn and Lynn. She is survived by a host of family relatives who lovingly called her "Aunt B."

Another year of providing grants to the non-profit sector to assist the underserved and disadvantaged populations, during which time we have intentionally attempted to give more grants to the needy and to follow Denver Mayor Hickenlooper's leadership in assisting homeless, hungry and afflicted people. I think the collective effort from the Denver funding community and non-profits is making a difference.

It is still frustrating to drive around the downtown streets of Denver and see the dozens of people holding up signs wanting food, a drink, one sign offering to eliminate one's mother-in-law. I have observed people making their signs in the park--helping one another design and spell out what they perceive will cause someone to look at them, roll down the window, and pass out some cash. I'm especially struck by anyone who is physically disabled, sitting in a wheelchair in hot or cold weather looking for a few bucks. I have a hard time driving by, so maybe I am an enabler, and one of the reasons why the wheelchair occupant is sitting at the corner.

Begging on a corner is not an easy task, but a very desperate act of need that probably ends up with money for alcohol and cigarettes. But, if one is into a lifetime of drinking and smoking---maintaining the addiction is what keeps one alive and at least standing on a Denver street corner.

I am learning in this business of helping people that "addiction" is a powerful word and creates many of the problems that we confront in the non-profit world. Most people would like to have a normal life, family and job, but the daily addiction to substance abuse just rules their very existence.

We have many agencies that deal with these challenges and they begin by providing shelter and food. Then comes some sort of detoxification program, clean clothes, some counseling, and a release back onto the street or a Denver housing program.

But, the past comes back to haunt the poor in the form of the IRS, bill collectors---collection agencies who want the first dollar that rehabilitated folks might make. Poor people are not given a chance to repair their lives before their past debts come back for collection. Surprising to me is the amount of money well-known agencies expect to collect from the poor, for services such as ambulance rides to detox, charges for staying in a shelter or extended stays in detox and recovery programs. It is hard to imagine that these facilities expect to be paid for all of their services, it appears they charge for them anyway and eventually turn over their bills to collection agencies.

Meanwhile, on behalf of a recovering addict, it is virtually impossible to get help, get back on one's feet, especially with numerous intimidating agencies chasing down payment for past bills and debts. It costs a recovering alcoholic at least \$1,800 to declare bankruptcy on over \$100,000 of medical and shelter bills. Another lien from the IRS for \$12,000 for unpaid taxes, although the person might have had his tools and van stolen by drug dealers.


To really help people back out of poverty and the living hell in which they live their days and nights it takes some real dedication. Step 13 and others are good places in Denver where for a few bucks a day a drunk can turn sober, get a safe, clean bed, take antabuse to chemically halt drinking and find a job during the day. Even then the person has to face the past and suffer the consequences of society wanting their pound of flesh for old bills, medical treatments, civil liens and judgments. The pressure is so great on many of these men and woman that they find it easier just to stay intoxicated.

How can we work together to better prepare these people to be productive, effective and useful members of our society?

FROM THE PRESIDENT: (CONT-D)

The bottom line is to recover their health and mental well-being, their human pride and self-esteem, and then to find a real job where they can support themselves and regain their dignity. Excuse the past, no, but give people a chance to repent and repay over time without severe penalties that are impossible to pay.

Non-profits could be doing a great deal more at the heart of the subject outlined here and get down to seriously helping get these poor people off the street and back into living as human beings once again. It can be done---but it will take the right people helping them who really care about the poor, not about abusing them and taking their last dime given to them on Broadway.

ABOUT OUR FOUNDER:



Kenneth King was born in Nederland, Texas on August 12, 1901. His father died when Kenneth was eight years old. His early childhood days revolved around working with his widowed mother at a family-run boarding house, both in Texas and later in Denver. In 1916, he and his mother and two brothers moved to Denver. Kenneth graduated from East High School in 1918. Determined to get a good education, he enrolled at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. He worked his way through four years of college, driving a taxi cab in Chicago, waiting tables at his fraternity house, and selling men's clothing in the Chicago Loop.

In 1929 Kenneth King founded Columbia Savings and Loan Association in Denver, Colorado with offices in Denver, Fort Collins, Colorado Springs, Pueblo, and Littleton with field staff serving all of Colorado. In 1958, Kenneth with his brother, Harold Taft King, built the Petroleum Building at Sixteenth and Broadway in downtown Denver.

In 1962 Columbia was sold to MCA, Inc. Kenneth remained on the Board until 1979, completing 50 years with Columbia Savings.

Kenneth King continued his work as an active philanthropist, supporting such organizations as Goodwill Industries, the Leukemia Society, Easter Seal Society, and countless church, civic and social services organizations.

While active with Columbia Savings, he hired a number of disabled employees and in 1963 was named Colorado Employer of the Year by then Governor John Love, and later received the Distinguished Service Award from President Lyndon Johnson, who cited him for "encouraging and promoting the employment of handicapped people."

He was a life member of Sigma Chi Fraternity. The Omega Chapter House at Northwestern University bears his name.

During his presidency of the Lions Club of Denver, he formed the Denver Lions Foundation, recognizing the need for Foundations to raise and distribute funds to worthwhile causes, such as the Lions' blind and hearing programs.

In 1990, Kenneth King founded the Kenneth King Foundation and became the organization's first president. Upon his death on April 25, 1992, Stevens Park Kinney II became the Foundation's second president and the Board of Directors selected by Kenneth King became active.

On November 30, 1993, President Kinney succumbed to a serious illness, and the five-member board elected Vice President Robert F. Sweeney as president.

The Board meets quarterly and at special meetings to review business operations and review grant proposals.

Kenneth King's motto throughout his life - and strongly carried out by his Foundation is:

**"To do the common thing in an uncommon way"**
