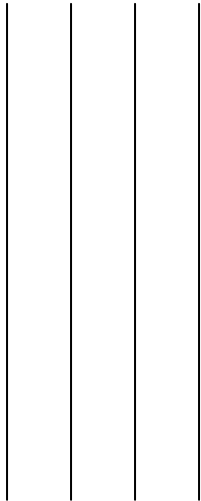

Non-Profit Community Members:

I enjoy Howie Mandel's role in the television series "Deal or No Deal." It is amazing to see the greed of the contestants, giving up six figure amounts to attempt to make the \$1 million dollar level. So far, at least in the programs that I've watched no one has opened the case to find the \$1 million reward; in fact a few have found only a few dollars losing some very attractive six-figure deals offered from the hidden banker. If you haven't watched this show you're far too busy, it has been on almost every weeknight for several months.

I think maybe grant writers face the same challenge when they prepare a proposal for a Foundation. How much do I ask for, should I ask for double the amount and hope to receive half; should I seek a larger amount or be on the safe side with a minimal request.

My advice is to ask for what you really want within common sense and reason. Foundations understand requests, needs, and budgets. When we receive a grant one of the first challenges is to look at the financials to understand the strength or weakness of the applying organization. We know that in most instances non-profits do not have great sums of money resting in their investment accounts...some do, most don't. Having too much money in reserve can be helpful or hurtful; sometimes when we see too much money in the investment account we feel that the non-profit doesn't need our financial assistance.

Having too little money or large annual shortfalls for more than one year also raises a red flag. Some major Colorado Foundations won't fund a non-profit with a two-year operating loss. Usually if we see a loss we'll call and ask why? Most of the time it is all tied up in accounting, real estate, loss of a development director, and occasionally just inadequate management and the subsequent shake-up of the organization and the loss of an Executive Director. We understand these actions and take these items into our consideration whether to approve a grant or not. The King Foundation directors receive a write-up on the proposal with staff recommendations and they vote their own conclusions. Sometimes when we convene they will seek larger amounts for certain organizations that they deem to be at the core of our mission of helping the poor, sick, disabled, and disadvantaged.

I just read an annual report that contains no financial information and a long list of what the Foundation "won't" fund. I think they are concentrating on too many negatives disregarding some pretty solid ground areas that can be used for plowing and seed money, at least.


Here at the Kenneth King Foundation we work hard to approve your grant, we'll call for more financial information; we'll do a visitation if we think you're really good or if we think you need more than financial help, maybe just some common sense advice. Our philosophy is to assist non-profits in any way possible to attain success, not failure.

FROM THE PRESIDENT: (CONT-D)

You'll note in this Annual Report that we write a lot of smaller grants to Colorado's rural communities. We feel that a check of any size is welcome in the far corners of Colorado and we find that from Cortez to Lamar non-profits appreciate all funds received in any amount.

Lastly, in a recent meeting of Foundation leaders they expressed many different opinions on advocacy. A growing number of Foundations desire to be advocates for change and are spending their money to create change in education, health care, gender and environmental challenges. Funding guidelines that Foundations usually follow depend upon the wishes of the donor, source of funds, and the board of directors. Kenneth King wished to help people directly and it was his desire to see children with dental care, the hungry fed, and homeless with a roof over their heads. He also believed that education is the only road out of poverty and ignorance.

Grant seeking is adherent to "Deal or No Deal" and we do want you to win!

ABOUT OUR FOUNDER:



Kenneth King was born in Nederland, Texas on August 12, 1901. His father died when Kenneth was eight years old. His early childhood days revolved around working with his widowed mother at a family-run boarding house, both in Texas and later in Denver. In 1916, he and his mother and two brothers moved to Denver. Kenneth graduated from East High School in 1918. Determined to get a good education, he enrolled at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. He worked his way through four years

of college, driving a taxi cab in Chicago, waiting tables at his fraternity house, and selling men's clothing in the Chicago Loop.

In 1929 Kenneth King founded Columbia Savings and Loan Association in Denver, Colorado with offices in Denver, Fort Collins, Colorado Springs, Pueblo, and Littleton with field staff serving all of Colorado. In 1958, Kenneth with his brother, Harold Taft King, built the Petroleum Building at Sixteenth and Broadway in downtown Denver.

In 1962 Columbia was sold to MCA, Inc. Kenneth remained on the Board until 1979, completing 50 years with Columbia Savings.

Kenneth King continued his work as an active philanthropist, supporting such organizations as Goodwill Industries, the Leukemia Society, Easter Seal Society, and countless church, civic and social services organizations.

While active with Columbia Savings, he hired a number of handicapped employees and in 1963 was named Colorado Employer of the Year by then Governor John Love, and later received the Distinguished Service Award from President Lyndon Johnson, who cited him for "encouraging and promoting the employment of handicapped people."

He was a life member of Sigma Chi Fraternity. The Omega Chapter House at Northwestern University bears his name.

During his presidency of the Lions Club of Denver, he formed the Denver Lions Foundation, recognizing the need for Foundations to raise and distribute funds to worthwhile causes, such as the Lions' blind and hearing programs.

In 1990, Kenneth King founded the Kenneth King Foundation and became the organization's first president. Upon his death on April 25, 1992, Stevens Park Kinney II became the Foundation's second president and the Board of Directors selected by Kenneth King became active.

In the latter part of 1993, President Kinney succumbed to a serious illness, and the five-member board elected Vice President Robert F. Sweeney to assume the current presidency in 1994.

The Board meets quarterly and at special meetings to review business operations and review grant proposals.

Kenneth King's motto throughout his life - and strongly carried out by his Foundation is:

"To do the common thing in an uncommon way"
