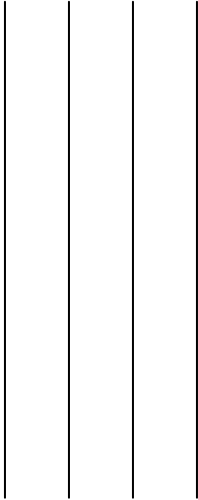

FROM THE PRESIDENT:

Dear Non-Profit Friends:

Every January we undergo our annual audit where CPA's come to our office and go over all of the income and expenses for the year. They make various comments about how we make and spend our money each year and this annual visit leads to our form 990 income tax report that is public record.

They have become increasingly critical of Foundation event participation. Down through the years we have had a viewpoint that we wanted to support "volunteerism" and that purchasing tables was a strong showing of support for groups attempting to raise funds from the public sector to help non-profit budgets. We really like the public stepping up to bat and contributing to fundraising events, walks, dinners, and galas.

The good news is that these events are strongly supported by many benefactors in Colorado who give freely of their time, talent and money to help the non-profits of their choice. The generosity of Americans is amazing and Colorado citizens have warm hearts. (No wonder we cannot win a war, we are just too nice of a nation and people, something we should not be ashamed about.)

The bad news is that there is not a day that goes by that we do not receive a half-dozen invitations to events. We would probably support a great many of them if the IRS rules were different. But, rather than making it easier for Foundations to support non-profit events--- it is becoming almost impossible to purchase any tickets or tables. And to purchase a ticket for one's spouse to attend an event would probably result in an IRS audit, that is according to the auditors. We cannot buy tables, we cannot buy partial tables because someone might benefit; and we can only go by ourselves if we must. We have to personally purchase a separate ticket for a wife or guest.


So, the time has come that the Foundation will not be purchasing any more tables for charitable events. Sure, we may buy some personal tickets and attend as individuals; we do that now! But, for our non-profit friends expect less Foundation participation at special events as the auditor network follows the dictates of Congress to oversee and tighten the regulations on Foundation spending.

We visit with many non-profits during the year and leaders are always looking for ways to raise money. It appears very evident to us that consistent, solid grant writing is the way to go, seeking out the many Foundations that fund your work in progress. We find time, and time again that organizations have a breakdown in grant writing; the staff member leaves, the new person does not properly research to see who the former donors were; and the grants never get sent out to the Foundations. Rest assured that if you do not apply--- you are not going to receive any money, simple as that.

Lastly, we hear this quite a bit, how hard it is to write a grant. It is only hard if you do not have the proper information that includes a mission statement, needs and some basic financial reports. You must put yourself to a test and make sure that you have good bookkeeping; strong volunteer support; and you are not showing successive year-end losses.

We have read thousands of grant proposals and the simple requests we understand quite well. Save your money on the slick paper, extra material and extra financial reporting.

Common sense and understanding still rule the day at the Kenneth King Foundation and we like to send grant money to those in need across the State. We may not be able to come to your dinner but we might answer your prayers!

ABOUT OUR FOUNDER:



Kenneth King was born in Nederland, Texas on August 12, 1901. His father died when Kenneth was eight years old. His early childhood days revolved around working with his widowed mother at a family-run boarding house, both in Texas and later in Denver. In 1916, he and his mother and two brothers moved to Denver. Kenneth graduated from East High School in 1918. Determined to get a good education, he enrolled at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. He worked his way through four years of college, driving a taxi cab in Chicago, waiting tables at his fraternity house, and selling men's clothing in the Chicago Loop.

In 1929 Kenneth King founded Columbia Savings and Loan Association in Denver, Colorado with offices in Denver, Fort Collins, Colorado Springs, Pueblo, and Littleton with field staff serving all of Colorado. In 1958, Kenneth with his brother, Harold Taft King, built the Petroleum Building at Sixteenth and Broadway in downtown Denver.

In 1962 Columbia was sold to MCA, Inc. Kenneth remained on the Board until 1979, completing 50 years with Columbia Savings.

Kenneth King continued his work as an active philanthropist, supporting such organizations as Goodwill Industries, the Leukemia Society, Easter Seal Society, and countless church, civic and social services organizations.

While active with Columbia Savings, he hired a number of disabled employees and in 1963 was named Colorado Employer of the Year by then Governor John Love, and later received the Distinguished Service Award from President Lyndon Johnson, who cited him for "encouraging and promoting the employment of handicapped people."

He was a life member of Sigma Chi Fraternity. The Omega Chapter House at Northwestern University bears his name.

During his presidency of the Lions Club of Denver, he formed the Denver Lions Foundation, recognizing the need for Foundations to raise and distribute funds to worthwhile causes, such as the Lions' blind and hearing programs.

In 1990, Kenneth King founded the Kenneth King Foundation and became the organization's first president. Upon his death on April 25, 1992, Stevens Park Kinney II became the Foundation's second president and the Board of Directors selected by Kenneth King became active.

In the latter part of 1993, President Kinney succumbed to a serious illness, and the five-member board elected Vice President Robert F. Sweeney to assume the current presidency in 1994.

The Board meets quarterly and at special meetings to review business operations and review grant proposals.

Kenneth King's motto throughout his life - and strongly carried out by his Foundation is:

"To do the common thing in an uncommon way"
